JOHN 15:1-11 (ESV)

15 "I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinedresser. 2 Every branch in me that does not bear fruit he takes away, and every branch that does bear fruit he prunes, that it may bear more fruit. ³ Already you are clean because of the word that I have spoken to you. 4 Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me. ⁵ I am the vine; you are the branches. Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing.

JOHN 15:1-11 (ESV)

⁶ If anyone does not abide in me he is thrown away like a branch and withers; and the branches are gathered, thrown into the fire, and burned. ⁷ If you abide in me, and my words abide in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you. 8 By this my Father is glorified, that you bear much fruit and so prove to be my disciples. 9 As the Father has loved me, so have I loved you. Abide in my love. 10 If you keep my commandments, you will abide in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and abide in his love. 11 These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full.




GOOD NEWS!

1. Father God, the Vinedresser

What is prune?

It is to trim by cutting away dead or overgrown branches or stems, especially to encourage growth.

1. Father God, the Vinedresser

- Pruning
 - is necessary for spiritual growth.
 - hurts but it helps.
 - shows that the Father is close to you.
 - shows the Father's tender loving care over you.
 - shows that the Father has your best interest in heart.
 - shows that the Father is working in you.
- The Father prunes by cleansing (Jn 15:2), convicting (Neh. 9:3), correcting (Ps. 119:67) and chastening (Heb. 12:1-11).

Would you allow Father God to prune so you can be more fruitful?

2. Jesus, the Vine

- To abide in Christ is to be in fellowship with Christ so that His life can work in and through us to produce much fruit.
- The symbolism of the Vine and branches is similar to the Head and the body. "And God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way." Ephesians 1:22-23
- The True Vine is a symbol of unlimited life and vitality.
- Branches need to abide in the Vine for life and fruit bearing.
- Dead branches from the Vine will be removed as they are unproductive.



2. Jesus, the Vine

- Bearing much fruit is a sign that the branch is constantly connected to the life-giving Vine.
- Our union with the Vine (Christ) is a living union, a loving union, and a lasting union.
- Apart from the Vine the branches can do nothing (15:5).
- Where are you in your walk or relationship with Christ?
- Do you meditate upon and live out God's eternal Word daily, participate in godly works or service actively, and winning souls constantly?



Abiding in the Vine, Jesus Christ

3. We, the Branches

- By itself, the branch is weak and useless.
- When one abides in Christ, one produces much fruit (15:2, 5), sees prayers answered (15:7), deepens in his/her love for Christ and one another (15:9) and experiences joy (15:11).
- Bearing much fruit proves you are a disciple of Jesus Christ (15:8)
- Being fruitful reveals a life of surrender, submission, sacrifice and service to Christ. Obedience!



3. We, the Branches

- The purpose of bearing fruit is to love and serve God and others.
- Attachment of the branches to the vine shows Jesus desires a close communion with us.
- This close communion must be cultivated through the disciplines of worship, study and meditation of God's Word, prayer, surrender, submission, sacrifice and service.

How fruitful are you as a branch of Christ?

Summary of John 15:1-11

- The more we abide in Christ, the more fruit we bear, and the more fruit we bear, the more the Father has to prune us so that the quality keeps up with the quantity. Left to itself, the branch might produce many clusters, but they will be inferior in quality. God is glorified by a bigger crop that is also a better crop.
- That's what the business of recalibration is all about.
